We are closely monitoring the restrictions and rest assured, as soon as it is safe to do so, we'll be right on to organising some community events.

As we watched the events of this week play out, it was clear how the great machine that is BSPS continues to work in its various ways in order to support our students. With minimal notice and not a single complaint, staff prepared learning packs to go home with students, began planning additional tasks and families once again shifted and moved to ensure learning could continue for all our kids.

LEARNING TO LEARN

This little blip hasn't stopped our momentum and as we wind up our Learning to Learn Program we could distinctively see the impact this has had on the establishment of outstanding learning environments across all areas of the school. The Learning to Learn program has evolved over the years and our current program has strengthened connections with First Nations Culture. We used a mentor text across the school, 'Finding Our Heart', which helped to anchor our work to a concept bigger than us.

We know that kids will not learn if they don't feel safe or have a sense of belonging and this work we do at the start of the year is some of our most important – we even have a little saying at BSPS 'Start how you want to finish!'.

HOLIDAY MAINTENANCE AND GROUNDS WORK

Every summer holiday break we have a big list of things to undertake during the extended period without kids, families and staff. We did nothing major this summer, but a few minor jobs have continued to improve our school environment. Our bus shelters (not that I've ever seen a bus stop at them) got a much needed coat of paint and freshen up. Some of the rotten seating in the courtyard was rebuilt and repainted and we even had a specially made wall constructed in one of our student toilets to help improve privacy for our kids (this was feedback we got from the kids and acted on immediately). Some steam cleaning and high level dusting also helped our areas to feel fresh and ready for another year of learning.

SCHOOL COUNCIL

Our 2021 School Council nomination process has now concluded and we can now notify families of the outcome. Given we had 3 vacancies and there were 3 nominations, there was no requirement to proceed to an election.

PARENT PAYMENTS

The 2021 Essential Education Item forms were sent home with your child late last year. In setting up our budgets for the beginning of the year we have been very overwhelmed with the collection rate from families and also the very generous contributions to our school beyond these essential items. In particular, our Library Fund has almost \$12,000 for us to purchase new reading materials for our school and classroom libraries. Thank you to those families who have contributed to our school financially and the additional support this provides us beyond our Department of Education funding.


- Establish significant time to get to know students and allow them time to get to know staff as significant adults in their lives

- Allow our students to identify the unique qualities they have that make them special promote our inclusive school culture
- To assist students and staff in making the transition into a new learning area and new people to our school community
- To provide students with an understanding of different strategies that will assist them in their learning and making positive choices as members of the BSPS Community
- To celebrate our schools commitment to student success academic, social & emotional and behavioural
- To promote and celebrate First Nations cultures and people




LEARNING TO LEARN

YEAR 3/4



We watched as water evaporated, we thought that even if these drawing will disappear, every time we'll walk on that spot, we'll think of that memory.










ART

BSPS NOTICES

B.S.P.S. INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC PROGRAMME

BSPS has two dedicated instrumental music teaching spaces, and currently engages eight Instrumental Music Teachers (IMTs) offering lessons in piano/keyboard, guitar, drums, violin and singing. All our IMTs have current Working With Children Checks and are experienced teachers and practitioners.

Lessons are usually 25 or 30 minutes long (this varies according to the teacher) and take place during lesson time. The IMTs collect students from their classrooms and ensure they return to their classroom after their lesson. IMTs endeavour to rotate their roster of students from week to week so that students do not miss the same classroom activity each week. Fees are set by the individual IMTs, but are generally around the guidelines offered by the Victorian Music Teachers' Association, the professional body for Instrumental Music Teachers. IMTs invoice parents directly for their fees and the preferred method of payment varies from teacher to teacher. IMTs also collect a small 'room hire fee' which goes to the school for reinvestment in the music programme.

Piano/keyboard lessons take place on the school's U1 Yamaha upright acoustic piano in the hall/stage (behind the orange wall), or on the digital pianos located in the Art Room and Performing Arts area. It will depend on which teacher/day a vacancy arises as to what instrument your child learns on. The waiting list for piano is across all 4 teachers and is kept by Maria Fitzgerald.

The programme is co-ordinated by a parent volunteer, Maria Fitzgerald.
