NAPLAN news

We're very excited about this year's NAPLAN results, with an initial review of this data showing very pleasing improvements in a range of measures. We're delighted to have exceeded our 2024 AIP targets in some cases. For example, Year 5 Numeracy: to increase the percentage of students "exceeding" from 11% in 2023 to 16%; but we actually achieved an impressive 29%!

NAPLAN is just one of a suite of assessment and tracking tools used in schools and we view this in the broader context of student growth and achievement. It is a useful tool in tracking the progress of individual students over time, as well as at a year level and whole school cohort level, helping us to ensure that every child receives the support they need to succeed.

We'd like to congratulate our Year 3 and 5s on giving it a go and doing their best during the NAPLAN assessments.

A special guest

We were pleased to welcome Dr Tim Read, Greens MP for Brunswick, to our school last week. He facilitated a lively Q&A session with our 3/4 students, who are in the midst of learning about the role governments play in society. Tim fielded a range of questions (many in Italian!) from our students on everything from active transport in our area to his background as a doctor and his motivation to become a politician. Tim and I popped into other learning areas during his visit, and he was very impressed with the focus and concentration of students and commented on all the smiling faces, which was lovely.

Sustainability Trail

Thank you to those who were able to join us for our exciting Sustainability Trail event this week! It really was a delight to see our students so confidently and happily explaining their work and their learning to both familiar and unfamiliar faces, and the sense of community as parents, carers, grandparents and siblings explored the trail. VEARS 5/6

Units Of Work by Tanisha

In Scienze, we have been learning about biology and how plants survive in different habitats. Last week, we started an experiment to test what plants need to grow. We planted bean seeds into three different pots. The first pot will receive sunlight and water, the second pot will receive darkness and water, and the third pot will receive sunlight and demineralised water. We have hypothesized which plants will die first and why. Stay tuned for the results!



In Humanities, we have been learning about Social Justice and, in particular, the rights of the child. Did you know that some countries sign a paper to follow the rules that it says on the paper?

Maths/Matematica by Lily

In Maths/Matematica, we have been practicing long division. This is the long division strategy that works for a lot of us:



A lot of different strategies were put to the test (repeated subtractions, groups of, etc...) but this one was the most efficient.

Do you know the division vocabulary?

Dividend ÷ divisor = quotient

An interesting rule: You cannot divide by zero!

Did you know? The relationship between multiplication and division is they are the opposite practise so they work together well!

Reading/Lettura by Flora

In Reading and Lettura we have been reading poems and learning how to analyse them. We have learnt lots about figurative language in poems, for example rhyme, similes, metaphors, alliteration, personification and more, but also the topic, main idea, structure and the point of view.



Writing/Scrittura by Flora

In Writing and Scrittura we have been writing poems to submit to the Poem Forest competition. The Poem Forest competition is a poetry competition for students around Australia that want to enter their poem about nature for a chance to win up to \$5,000 worth of prizes! We have also been writing poetry to evoke emotions by including lots of figurative language.

This week is Bullying, No Way Week. The theme for 2024 is 'Everyone belongs'.


When we all feel like we belong, bullying struggles to find a place. It's about embracing who we are, respecting everyone's differences and standing up together against unkindness.

STEM

What we did in STEM

In STEM in the last two terms, we have been making bee friendly gardens and a bee hotel. First we started adding more soil and started to dig up the ground to add air to the soil, then we made bunting to go around the garden. Then we made mud bricks and after that we planted plants. The reason we did this is that native bees are competing for flowers and homes.

In the first session we started to make a garden, we first put in the garden stakes then put string around the outside then before pulling out the soil and then watered the ground and put the soil back. Some kids dug up the ground looking for grubs to protect the plants.

On the second session, we designed a bee hotel so they could live. We studied some of the bees habits and picked 2-3 bees so we could make a personalised bee hotel. Did you know that most bees like to live solitary lives meaning most of them live alone?

Some types of bees are:



European honey bee





Teddy Bear bee



Amegilla cingulata





Carpenter bee

On the third session we went out to Gnome Village to make mud bricks. The reason we were making mud bricks was for making the bee hotel. First we cut the tops of milk cartons to make the mold then we made a mixture of sand and water. We had to make the mixture perfect otherwise it would be too hard or soft. We put the mixture in the milk carton and we poked holes in them.

Next we started planting plants for the garden. We had a variety of plants. We had a lot of native plants. When the bee lands on the flower, it gets rid of the positive electric charge and bees can sense the magnetic field so they know what flowers have been visited.

Thank you for reading our text on what we have been doing in STEM these last two terms.

This term, the Year 3/4 students are learning about STEM inventions that help reduce climate change, habitat destruction and pollution.

Recently, they have been learning about thermal solar energy. They made a solar hotwater system out of narrow black piping and left it in the sun to see how much iy would heat up . One group managed to get their water to heat up 15 degrees in 1 hour, which was pretty good considering it was 12 degrees outside.

The students also made a solar oven and attempted to melt a piece of chocolate in it. The sun kept moving (one of the challenges of solar energy!) but we got there in

Next week, the students will make bioplastic out of cornflour. We will place a few pieces aside so we can measure how long the bioplastic takes to degrade.

Last week, the Year 5/6 students explored how they can use their native bee attracting garden to promote the cause of bees to the broader community . They decided to make a series of signs and noticeboards containing information on Victoria's native bees and things people can do to help them. They also decided to make a website and some pamphlets on our local bees and start constructing a seed library so locals can exchange seeds.

We also started building some bee hotels out of the materials we salvaged from the recent clean-out of our school storage container. We are using the lino left over from the staffroom toilet renovation for our roofs, and old drama props and a retired pie warmer for our structures. The bee hotels will be filled with mud bricks (for burrowing bees) and cane and hardwood hollows (for bees who nest in bark, decaying wood and hollow plant stems).
