# FOUNDATION

On Thursday 26th October, Year 10 Scotch College students studying Italian, visited the Foundation students at BSPS for a wonderful bilingual 'Read to Someone' experience!





The Scotch College students had worked hard to create texts in Italian about a variety of topics such as 'Natale in Italia', 'Mangio gelato!' and 'II mio viaggio in Australia'.

When they arrived we welcomed them with our 'Buongiorno' song in Italian and then sat to read with them in small groups. We loved every minute of it!





It was a fantastic experience that allowed us to share our mutual love of learning Italian and reading. The best part is that we get to keep the books and use them in our Literacy Program! Grazie mille Scotch College and we hope to see you again soon!







During Week 3, the Year 1/2 's were lucky enough to visit the Melbourne Museum. The day was packed with exhibitions and activities. We went with all of our teachers and also some parent helpers, and we had the best day!

Our first stop was Dynamic Earth. We walked in and we saw phenomenal crystals! There were so many different shapes and sizes of crystals, like the shapes of bubbles and also spikes! After looking at the crystals, we walked into a mysterious dome. It turned out to be a projector that showed us how the world worked! Our favourite part of the dome was the dramatic lava cave. We had to dodge the massive lava waves!

The next stop was the dinosaur walk. You stepped in and there were so many different types of bones and fossils from different dinosaurs. We learnt that dinosaurs don't use their hands a lot, but instead, they use their mouth!

Melbourne Story followed the dinosaur walk. We went to the Mini Mega Model Museum (MMMM!) There were a lot of rooms AND there were even rooms within a room! One had a camera where you could watch people on the other side of the wall in the other room! When we exited the MMMM, we went inside a rickety, old house. Some people got a bit of a fright, but then got used to it after a while! Some of us even started to play in the bedrooms. We learnt that not all people have new-ish houses or apartments and saw how houses used to be many years ago.

The Year 2's had an exclusive experience in a program called "My Grandmother's Toybox". We had one of the museum teachers reading us a story about a person who discovered different toys that her grandmother had when she was young. It was really interesting to see the difference between toys now and toys a long time ago. One toy that we thought was really weird was a ball made out of possum fur. There was also a homemade doll, a brownie box camera and a skipping rope made out of rope and wood. They didn't use plastic much in the past.

The Year 1's were able to visit the First Peoples Gallery. Our first stop was the Language Map. It had roughly 55 different languages that you could listen to. There was a table with possum fur that was used for coats a long time ago. And there was a huge nest with a Bunjil flapping around in it. There was a person in an audio book telling a story about Bunjil. We learnt that the aboriginals believe that Bunjil was the creator of the land and the people.

We had such a great day and we hope that other year levels can visit the museum to see all the awesome exhibitions!







# PE

The junior school students have started the term off by revisiting skipping. It was great to see how many students have held on to their skipping capabilities and some tricks from last year.

The students have also been exploring sports like basketball and touch footy (NRL), whilst also having a session to create their own movement sequences with PE equipment for other students to try. Please remember to check your child has a hat packed for PE and school.

We have been practicing and developing these skills during Amici Insieme and continue to refine them further in class! It also gives you a chance to observe different situations and discuss what it would feel like to be in that situation yourself!

### Discussion starters:

- Discuss what a character is feeling based on the situation in the book. How would you help them if they were needing help or feeling angry or upset?
- Discuss the strategies the characters use to solve problems in the story. Are there any different strategies they could use?
- Identify why it was important for the characters to act the way they acted.

Another resource you may be interested in is a podcast by Dr. Billy Garby called 'Popculture Parenting'. It is about finding the sweetspot between the textbooks and real life when it comes to parenting. Dr Billy (a developmental pediatrician) and Nick (a developing parent) are a couple of dads having honest discussions about parenting day to day.

## Amici Insiemi

This week was our last official Amici Insieme session! We have had 8 weeks of meeting on Mondays in our groups and being led by our Amici Insieme leaders through activities and games around Keeping Friends.

It has been incredible to see everyone growing in confidence and deepening connections across all grades. A big shout out to our amazing 5/6 Leaders who stepped up to the challenge with an open mind and continued to impress all the staff as they built on their life skills such as assertiveness, organisation, problem-solving, perseverance etc!





Here's some student comments about their experience of Amici Insieme:

- "I liked seeing how different people at different ages approach the activities and I like working with the little kids and just getting to know them and just having fun. It's really nice to see the kids grow more comfortable with you every week."
- "My favourite part was spending time with the younger grades I don't normally get to spend time with."
- "I learn stuff in a fun way!"
- "I like that I can look after people that are smaller than me and look up to people who are older than me."



# STEM

This term, the 1/2 students are investigating different houses around the world. They have studied portable and temporary houses such as huts, tents and teepees, and learned how homes are designed in accordance with materials available at the time, and the climate of the region.

Last week, they made huts out of materials they gathered at the Park Street Reserve. This week, the 1/2s learned about a mud brick house project Noel (one of our grandparent volunteers) is involved in India (through CERES) and made mud bricks out of clay, pea grass and water. Next week, we will assess the durability of our mud bricks and try and ascertain what ratio of pea grass to dirt works best and whether the dirt at the Park Street Reserve contains enough clay to make a strong and sturdy mudbrick.















This week the Foundation students learned that you can make things move using static electricity. They drew halloween characters, such as witches, ghosts and spiders, on tissue paper, cut them out, and stuck them on the table. They then rubbed a balloon on their head to create a static charge, and used the charge to lift their halloween character off the table and wiggle it about, as if the character were dancing. Once the halloween

characters had perfected their dance moves, they were all invited to dance to the song 'Monster Mash' at our Halloween disco.


